Morning Breakout Sessions (choose one):

A Transformative Conversation with the Black and Dyslexic Podcast

Hosts: LeDerick Horne, LeDerick Horne Speaks, LLC and Winifred A. Winston, Dyslexia Advocation Inc.

Join co-hosts Winifred Winston and LeDerick Horne for a live recording of the Black and Dyslexic Podcast. This session will feature a panel discussion consisting of young adults and professionals who will explore the intersectionality of being Black and Neurodivergent. The panel will share their stories and provide advice to educators from their own experiences. Educators will be provided with concrete tips and strategies on developing culturally competent and inclusive approaches to empowering diverse learners. This upbeat and interactive session will end with a live Q & A from the audience.

Find Your Calm Through Poetry Presenter: Erika Kelley, CEO & Principal Consultant, Sage Horizons, LLC

Trauma is an emotional response to a distressing event or situation that breaks a sense of security. Anyone can experience trauma due to an injury, a frightening situation or painful events from our past. We may experience trauma responses or triggers. This is normal and not a character flaw or a weakness. However, unprocessed trauma may impact our relationships, instruction and parenting to children, and care that we provide to families. During this workshop, we will explore research that demonstrates links between writing and emotional processing and learn how to mitigate trauma and increase our emotional resilience using poetry.

Interruption and Disruption: How Representative Curricula Fosters Better Student Outcomes

Presenters: NJEA Consortium Design Team Ambassadors

This session will be led by the NJEA Consortium Design Team Ambassadors. We will focus on how incorporating inclusive pedagogy and practice allows teachers to disrupt the majority model and interrupt potential negative student outcomes often connected to systemic exclusion and/or marginalization in the classroom. The incorporation of inclusive policies, practices, and pedagogies across content matter and grade level fosters better student outcomes, school and community belonging, and the creation of an affirming culture and climate.

New Jersey Statewide Student Support Services (NJ4S): A Statewide Response to the Youth Mental Health Crisis

In response to a national mental wellness crisis in youth and young adults, the New Jersey Department of Children and Families has proposed to launch a statewide, innovative hub-and-spoke model of services and resources intended to support youth mental wellness and promote prevention initiatives (prevention of bullying, prevention of teen suicide, prevention of substance use, etc.). Participants will learn about what the model looks like, have an opportunity for Q&A and space to imagine what this model could look like in their district.

Reaching Every Student: Adaptations, Accommodations, & Modifications Presenter: Susan Coll-Guedes, M.Ed., New Jersey Coalition for Inclusive Education

How can educators design instruction to meet the unique needs of students in the inclusive classroom? Learn strategies for creating supported, engaging and flexible learning environments to meet student needs through exploring adaptations, accommodations, and modifications.

To reflect this diversity, the New Jersey Department of Education has passed various mandates to expand, reflect and build on the rich diversity of our great state. But how can we, as classroom teachers, address this diversity legally, pedagogically & literally in our K-12 classrooms?
